










What was the USS Monitor?












USS *Monitor* and the CSS *Virginia* engage in the first battle of steam powered ironclads. The battle ushers in a new era of naval technologies and naval warfare.



History and Technologies Worth Preserving














In 1973 a team of scientists aboard Duke University Research Vessel *Eastward* located the shipwreck remains of what they believed to be the USS *Monitor* lying upside down in 230 feet of water approximately 16 miles off Cape Hatteras, North Carolina.

In 1974, they confirmed that the shipwreck was in fact the Monitor.





Designation

Whereas Title III of the Marine Protection, Research, and Sanctuaries lot of 1972, Public Law 92-532, authorizes the Secretary of Commerce, with the approval of the President of the United States, to designate Marine Sanctuaries; and, Whereas the wreckage of the U.S.S. Menitor has recently been identified; and,

Thereas it is the consensus of concerned organizations and individuals that the wreckage should be protected for its historic, cultural, and technological values; and;

Whereas the vased has been placed on the National Register of Historic Places;

Itherefore, designate the site of the U.S.S. Monitor to be


the area of which is to encompass a vortical section of the water column from the surface to the seabed and extending horizontally one mile in diameter from a center point located at 3500 23. North Latitude and 15 2432 "Nest Longitude; and hereby affirm that the regulations promulgated according to the aforementioned, authority will provide the necessary protection of law to preserve the esthetic values of this Historic Place.

January 30 1975

The *Monitor* National Marine Sanctuary was established by Congress on January 30, 1975, the 113th Anniversary of the *Monitor's* launching at Greenpoint, NY.




